Haughley Hoofers Perform traditional dog dances from North West England. The side was started by Heather Bexon from Stowmarket and has been based in Haughley for about 38 years (no one can quite remember when we started.) Membership is drawn mainly from the local area, though we have had members from Haverhill and Hadleigh. Last year's summer season felt as though we were getting back to normal after the pandemic. We began with performances for 2 villages celebrating the Queen's Platinum Jublice (including a brief appearance for Haughley). We danced at three folk festivals: Folk at the Boat, Ipswich. The Lobster Potty Festival, Sheringham and Ely Folk Festival, also Walsham-le-Willows Open Gardens, Felsham Street Fair and (of course) the odd pub, meeting other sides. Sadly, The East Anglian Music Trust's Traditional Music Day in Stowmarket last September was cancelled by the organisers due to Covid concerns. It is hoped to run it this year on Saturday 2nd September.

The highlight of 2022 came in August, dancing with other sides at the Normandy Morris Festival. This week-long festival takes place every three years and is organised by two dancers who used to be based in Striffel. Mainly Striffolk Ancer groups attend, but there are other nationalities too, Morris is a broad church! We tour the local towns, dancing in the market squares, plus in the evening or on the odd afternoon off, there may be sightseeing, a barbecue, a ceilidh or a music workshop. Over the years we have taken part in several of these trips, in France, Belgium and Germany. Always good fun and greatly appreciated by local people.
